

3.0 WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT THE 2024 CLINICAL SNAPSHOT AUDITS

In this section we identify where you can find detailed explanation of the **Snapshot audit**, the timeline for 2024 and the schedule of webinars to help you understand and navigate the Snapshot audit.



3.1 **INFORMATION**

- The VIP snapshot is a valuable way to collect national data on the IPV and CAN service delivery. As we are all auditing in a standard way and entering the data on the same database, we can 'compare apples with apples' and calculate national estimates of service delivery.
- The Snapshot isn't measuring how well you are doing your job as VIP coordinator. It is measuring whether the system is enabling best practice.
- The VIP evaluation project is approved by the Health and Disability Ethics Committee (AKY/03/09/218/AM12; most recent annual report 07 March 2024). You will never be asked for patient name, NHI number or other identifiable data.

3.2 **TIMELINE 2024**



MARCH TO APRIL

- Meet with your quality manager, clinical records and IT manager to let them know that this audit is a Ministry of Health requirement
- Take the document 'VIP Evaluation Information: Snapshot Clinical Audits (2024)' with you and discuss eligiblity criteria for each of the 6 services.
- Test logingg in and check out past clinical audits results for your district. https://vipsnapshot.aut.ac.nz/

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AUDIT PERIOD 1 APRIL TO 30 JUNE

- The people you met with above, will be required to provide 25 random NHIs from each of the 6 priority areas between 1 April 2024 and 30 June 2024. This means they won't be able to provide you with the data until after 30 June 2024

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SEPTEMBER 2024

- Once you have received the NHIs you will need to log in to the Snapshot database and enter the data as per the 'VIP Evaluation Information: Snapshot Clinical Audits (2024)' document.
- You will be required to complete this by 1st September 2024.



4.0 FINAL 2022 DELPHI OVERALL AND DOMAIN SCORES

The National Evaluation team have completed all the Delphi external audits and are preparing the national report. In the meantime, we thought you might be interested in summary results. Based on self-reported infrastructure data, the median score for 2022 was 75 (range 45 to 91). This compares to pre-COVID-19 median scores of 71 in 2018 and 80 in 2019.

For 2022, the external audit scores based on site visits were lower that the self-audit scores. This is not unexpected due to the clarity that is offered about item measurement during site visits. The distribution of external audit scores is shown in the Figure on the next page. Policies and Procedures and Documentation were the highest scoring Delphi tool domains.





5.0 IMPROVING THE DELPHI INFRASTRUCTURE TOOL

Since the November 2023 VIP coordinators meeting in Rotorua, we have been updating the Delphi Tool. During site visits in 2023, we collected ideas and suggestions from you on what could be done to make the Delphi Tool easier to use and therefore more effective.

There are some items that are 'grey areas' since we are now Te Whatu Ora and we are unsure what impact the amalgamation of the District Health Boards to a single entity will mean for specific Delphi items.

At this stage, feedback received is only from VIP coordinators and the original tool had input from internal and external agencies and individuals. We are currently working to ensure we receive comprehensive feedback on our review of the Delphi.

Sarah Herbert is supporting a small group of VIP coordinators who have a particular interest in reviewing the Māori cultural and Te Tiriti responsiveness of the Delphi tool. Please contact Sarah if you would like to be part of this work: vip-eval@aut.ac.nz, Attn: Sarah Herbert.

We aim to update the tool and to provide you with more clarification on some of the measurement criteria that may be confusing. We will probably do this in written format and also an online workshop. If you have any input on the tool that you would like to send us, please email **kathyl@adhb.govt.nz** who will compile and share it with the group.

Once the Delphi tool has been updated, there needs to be a reasonable amount allowed for VIP coordinators to apply it and complete a self-audit, before another external audit can be timetabled. This will not occur in 2024.
